#### **Christmas Reflections**

As we move through Advent towards Christmas, we are sadly mindful of the conflict and violence within that part of the world where Jesus lived, died, and rose again.

I invite you to read and ponder these poignant words from Fr Jim Carty SM.

An article in The Australian newspaper described the Palestinian and Israeli children as "the lost generation", traumatised because they are reared on a diet of violence.

Psychologists fear they may be damaged for life.

The article describes in distressing detail the impact, both physical and emotional, the ongoing violence is having on these children and concludes with the chilling prediction, based on their research, that many of these traumatised children will become violent adults. Childhood trauma is the key-underlying factor in perpetuating conflict. And without treating trauma in children, violence will continue and tear apart the lives of yet another generation.

Palestinian and Israeli children and their suffering and pain is but one example of children throughout the world who suffer because of war and exploitation.

The fact is, Jim wrote these words as part of his Christmas message at the end of 2001, 22 years ago. How profound....

Jim's final words offer a message of hope, with some help from Pope Francis,

What message of hope, what message of compassion, what message of tolerance can I offer that will sustain and uplift, and bring us

a deeper appreciation of God's incomparable and unencumbered love expressed in the event of the birth of his son so many years ago?

#### Pope Francis suggests:

"Christian hope is no facile optimism, no placebo for the credulous: it is the certainty, planted in love and faith, that God never abandons us and remains faithful to his promise: 'Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I fear no evil, for you are with me'."

## Brother Des (Terence) Murphy March 1933 - 1st October 2023



Des Murphy FMS was our <u>original Marist</u>
Brother Liaison for MLA. Even before MLA
existed, Des was on a committee called The
Wider Marist Family, which was made up of a
member from each of the 4 Religious
branches and a handful of committed lay
Marists. Their brief was to nurture MLA into a
living entity.

Brother Des did his job well! In 2003 he remained with us on the core committee for many years, encouraging us, giving practical and spiritual advice and keeping the Marist Brothers informed on this fledgling branch of the Marist family. He brought the spirit of Marcellin Champagnat to our group and always participated in our regular reflection days. He facilitated some of our events and helped us to secure the beautiful Mittagong venue for several MLA events.

Des never waned in his passion for MLA. He was our staunch supporter.

In July this year, when he heard about MLA organising the Harbour Bridge Walk to celebrate Fourviere, he was thrilled. "What brilliant idea!"

## **Beryl Prescott entered Eternal Life on** 23<sup>rd</sup> November 2023



Beryl was a member of the original MLA core committee.

A long-time resident of the Rocks area in Sydney, she worked as a volunteer at St Brigid's church, which was ministered by the Marist Fathers who lived at the nearby Marist parish of St Patrick's Church Hill.

Baryl, and her long-time friend Dawn Caruana, were involved in many ministries at St Brigid's: Eucharistic ministry, visiting the sick, elderly and lonely, preparing the church for weddings and Baptisms and organising the Christmas functions with the Marist team from St Pat's. She was involved with fund-

raising and a plethora of other community services like helping locals with child-minding and household chores when needed – all signs of a close-knit community.

But Beryl never saw herself then as a lay Marist. She just naturally loved being involved and helping out where she could. When the opportunity arose to go on a Marist pilgrimage to France, England and Italy in April 2003, she enthusiastically grabbed it! Fr Ray Chapman SM led our group through this most wonderful Marist immersion and that changed everything for Beryl. She willingly agreed to join MLA and was on the committee for many years.

She attended a Marist Laity Conference in Boston in 2004.

In 2008, when MLA held an International Lay Marist Conference in Sydney, Beryl was in her element, taking charge of Hospitality for local and overseas participants.

In later years, Beryl volunteered at the St Pat's Coffee shop.

Beryl was a faithful lay Marist and she attended nearly every MLA event over the years. She came to realise she'd always had the Marist spirit.

In the words of her friend Dawnie: "She loved people, loved parties and loved the David Jones Oyster and Champagne Bar!" Beryl, we will miss you and your fun-loving personality. THNK YOU, for being a vital part of MLA!

## Sr. Mary Keegan SMSM 21<sup>st</sup> February 1933 – 24<sup>th</sup> November 2023

Sr Mary Keegan was our original smsm (Missionary Sisters of the Society of Mary) liaison for MLA and, like Br. Des, was on the Wider Marist Family Committee, which encouraged lay Marists to fulfil the dream of Fr Colin SM, to create a Marist Lay branch.

Mary Keegan, along with her dear friend Sr Marie-Berise Nash SM, were lovingly named the GRANDMOTHERS of MLA!!

As a missionary sister, Mary spent many years in the Solomon Islands, a few in Papua New Guinea and a short stint in Bangladesh. Mary was totally committed to the creation of a lay branch in its own right and couldn't wait for this new movement to get going. In the year 2000, a few of us put forward the idea of celebrating the July Fourviere out in the wild western suburb of Westmead! Up until then, Fourviere had always been celebrated by the Marist Family at Hunters Hill with Mass followed by afternoon tea. I can clearly remember Mary saying "Go for it!" This was something NEW, DIFFERENT, a breath of fresh air. Our own Cathy Larkin gave the homily, followed by an Aussie BBQ! Mary stayed with us on the core committee for several years and the SMSM's helped our new, little branch grow over the years.



There was never any time that Mary wanted to tell us what to do or how to do it! None of this "Sister knows best" stuff! She had

complete faith in the ability of lay people to DO THE WORK OF MARY (ie. Mary, the Mother of Jesus). She knew that lay Marists could THINK, JUDGE and ACT as Mary did. When Sr Marie-Berice and I visited two weeks before she died, she was "on fire" with the Spirit. Colour in her cheeks, a crystal clear mind and an energy that was electric. Lying in her bed in the palliative care ward in Mt Druitt hospital, her farewell words to us were

"This is what I was born for!"

## Lay people caring for the poor

Recently, I had a conversation with someone who was heavily involved in bringing a prominent Catholic lay movement for couples to Australia in the early 1990s. He was very passionate about evangelization and bringing the good news of God to people who may not have come into contact with it or whose faith had waned. I asked him, 'Why did you stop being so passionately involved?' He explained that the direction had moved away from his own values of caring for the poor. The Catholic lay group wanted to focus heavily on prayer rather than on works of social justice. As I listened, I thought that serving the poor and prayer or contemplation go hand in hand. He reminded me of Pope Francis' call in his document 'Fratelli Tutti' to see each person as our own brother and sister and to care for the poor. But this is easier said than done. Going to the margins, caring for the poor, and helping those most in need requires great risk. Jesus never said, 'Blessed are those who are safe and comfortable'; rather, 'Pick up your cross and walk.' This challenges our Western way of doing things, our climbing of the corporate ladder, and instead calls us to do exactly the opposite. Blessed are we when we are poor.



In my role as a Youth Ministry Coordinator, I've been honoured to guide young minds on Street Retreats, a transformative initiative where students encounter the realities of homelessness firsthand. Thrice a term in 2023, groups of 12 to 15 students have traversed the streets of Sydney's CBD, not as mere observers but as listeners and learners of the profound stories that lie beneath the surface of homelessness. These narratives of addiction, family strife, mental health challenges, abuse, and financial suffering offer invaluable lessons on the impact of life's choices.

These encounters have left indelible marks on the hearts of our students, igniting within them a profound commitment to compassion. The faces we often overlook in our daily hustle are no longer just part of the cityscape but individuals with rich histories and a deepseated yearning for connection and love.

#### A Call to Reflect and Act

As we continue these Street Retreats, it is our hope that more individuals will be moved to not just hear, but act—to see beyond the statistics and recognize the inherent dignity in every person. We are called not to the safety of the sidelines but to the frontlines of love and service, where we truly live out the beatitudes. In this journey, we find that it is not we who change the lives of the homeless, but they who change us, teaching us the essence of humanity. This is the heart of evangelization, not just in word but in deed. *Andrew Dumas*
